KEEP Australia Beautiful Tasmania has entered into an arrangement with AuSSI-Tasmania and the Alcorso Foundation.

All AuSSI schools in Tasmania, around 100, will be invited to enter an awards program next year by completing an online application.

Those schools considered to be top performers in the two categories of "COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT" and "ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION" in each of the three regions, North, North West and South will be eligible to win prize money of \$1500 in each category. Total prize money of \$9000 builds on the current \$3000 generously provided by the Alcorso Foundation. The top performing schools will be personally visited by judges drawn from the three partners' ranks. It is hoped that this initiative will further promote school involvement in the outstanding AuSSI initiative. Watch out for further announcements and Notice of Entry.

2010 was a successful year for all Sustainable Communities programs in Tasmania.

Forty eight communities were visited by Innkeeper judge, Barrie Muir during almost six weeks on the road. Over 240 projects were assessed and recognised under the National and Tasmanian judging categories. All award details are shown further on in this newsletter.

Our 2010 National finalists in Tidy Towns and Clean Beaches, Richmond and West Beach, Burnie represented the State in outstanding fashion in Canberra and North Steyne, Manly respectively. At the time of preparation we all eagerly await the outcome of the City of Clarence's bid in the Australian Sustainable Cities awards to be held in Sydney on 1 November 2010. Good luck Clarence!

2010 is New Norfolk's first Tidy Towns win which follows a lot of effort by the large, hard working Derwent Valley Tidy Towns Committee. It will be Tasmania's finalist in the Australian Tidy Towns Awards scheduled for April next. Burnie is again in the

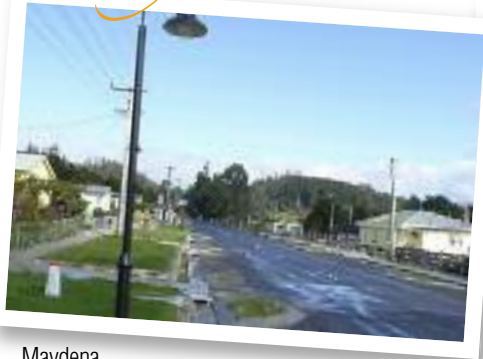

The civic leaders have shown imagination and understanding of the city's requirements and have demonstrated a clear understanding of what needs to happen if it is to be sustainable well into the future.

The environmentally pro-active community members have demonstrated an ability and willingness to roll up their sleeves and get things done. As one drives into the city there are many clear indications that local government and the community, in general, are working really well together.

Of particular note is the area from West Park right through to the wharfs where international cruise ships are given a "welcome to Burnie" that they will always remember – an area which has been redeveloped in a very modern but environmentally sensitive way. A unique

It is also very pleasing to see the importance which the city places on the health and well-being of its community – a key factor when assessing a town or city's sustainability.

Although the number of schools to enter the KAB Tasmania Schools Environment Award program was disappointingly low, the standard of the entries was very high. It was clearly evident that schools had been very environmentally aware when putting into place redevelopment programs made possible through funding from the federal government.

The school to come out on top across the three judging categories was Wynyard High School, a school which presents itself well, interacts well with its community and deals with the many & varied issues of sustainability across its learning areas. That aspect is most evident in displays around the

school. It was equally evident that parents and friends of the school community take an active interest in the school's activities, some of whom are involved in a very successful mentoring program.

It was very pleasing to note how students of all grades are involved in how the school presents itself environmentally to the community, assisting with gardens and outdoor decor. Right bin the RIGHT thing

THE Packaging Stewardship Forum (PSF) of the Australian Food and Grocery Council partners with government, industry, business and NGO's to deliver recycling and litter reduction and education programs across Australia on behalf of its members, Australia's largest beverage companies and their packaging suppliers - Amcor, Bundaberg Brewed Drinks, Coca-Cola Amatil, Fosters, Golden Circle, Lion Nathan, Owens-Illinois, Schweppes and Visy.

The PSF is the joint principal sponsor of the Keep Australia Beautiful Tasmanian Tidy Towns and John Donaghy Awards and the Tasmanian Awards for Environmental Excellence, to acknowledge and celebrate the contributions communities make to "doing the right thing" for our environment.

Recycling in Tasmania ...

Over the last 12 months the PSF installed new recycling and waste bins stations carrying the Do the Right Thing use the Right Bin message at Launceston airport, giving 1.2 million passengers and retailers the opportunity to recycle for the first time. The new bin infrastructure and signage has been embraced by airport retailers and visitors alike, with more than 9.4 tonnes of recyclables collected since November 2009 – equivalent to around 1,300 household recycling bins!



Inveresk Precinct followed Aurora Stadium's lead and thanks to a PSF grant installed state of the art waste and recycling bins throughout the precinct. These new systems service visitors to the precinct as well as up to 16,000 footy fans at every Hawthorn home game of the season.

A joint initiative between the PSF and Derwent Entertainment Centre will soon see Derwent Entertainment Centre recycling at the venue for the first time. The project aims to divert more than 2 tonnes of recyclable material from the Centre each year.



New metal "Do the Right Thing Use the Right Bin" signage has also been installed on public place recycling bins throughout Hobart City Council and, through a partnership with Tasports, new signage will soon be installed throughout the port of Hobart.

The University of TAS was the first higher education institution in Tasmania to sign on to the PSF's Higher Education Institutions Recycling Program, installing new systems for students and staff at their Hobart campus. Soon new systems will also be installed at their Launceston and Newman campuses.



In an Australian first, Clarence City Council, in partnership with Veolia Environmental Services, Hazell Brothers Group and the PSF ran the first public demonstration trial using recycled crushed glass sand in construction applications. Clarence City Council

constructed a new car park at the Rosny Park Tennis Club in February 2010 using 53 tonnes of recycled glass sand – equivalent to nearly 300,000 stubbies! The recycled glass sand was used in the pipe bedding, asphalt, sign pole footings, concrete footpaths, kerbing and guttering.

Do The Right Thing Signage Support Program



Eight (8) Tasmania communities and organisations were successful in gaining free roadside signs, waste and recycling stickers and posters from the PSF during 2009-2010. A total of 12 roadside signs, 353 waste and recycling bin stickers and 115 posters were provided to the following communities to support their litter reduction and recycling activities at a local level: Break O'Day Council; Brighton Council; Central Coast Council; Glenorchy City Council; Mackillop Catholic College; Mount Carmel College; St Josephs Catholic School; St Virgil's College
